INTRODUCTION

Our Club was founded in 1969 to cater for those owners of purebred dogs who were interested in training their dogs to Obedience Trial standard. The club was so successful in this regard that it was granted

affiliation with KCC (Kennel Control Council). In 1979 Victorian Canine Association (now Dogs Victoria) accepted all dogs into Obedience trials and the club was then also opened to all dogs.

CLUB RULES

- 1. Your dog is to be kept on leash at all times. The only exception is when given explicit instruction to work off lead in class.
- 2. Handlers wishing to leave their dogs tethered on Club grounds should only do so if their dogs are safe with people, especially around children. No dog may be tethered when it can reach another dog.
- 3. Dogs must be fully immunised before coming to classes which needs to be kept up-to-date.
- 4. Any sick dog, or one suffering from a communicative illness, are not to come to classes until Vet cleared.
- 5. Handlers are responsible for removal of their dogs' excreta from the training area.
- 6. We teach rewards-based training. Physical and excessive verbal abuse of dogs in not allowed. Any observed behaviour of this type will lead to expulsion from the club.
- 7. Instructors have authority over their classes and may ask a member to take their dog out of class if it is overly disruptive.
- 8. While at the grounds, before and after classes, please remain in control of your dogs, and respect the space of other dogs and handlers.
- 9. Dogs in season should not attend training for four weeks. However, this does not mean you should stop attending classes nor cease the training of your dog.
- 10. If an Instructor considers your dog to be aggressive, the Chief Instructor will evaluate your dog as to its suitability to be trained at ESODC. If required, the dog may be asked to wear a muzzle while at training or private professional instruction / organisations may be recommended. Remember, we are a Community Dog Club, we do not offer specialised behavioural modification training.

President's Report

Hats off to our amazing members who generously offered their time on the day to help set up all the rope rings, add in all the equipment, set up ringside tables, chairs, rubbish bins, and the cabana on field. The field looked amazing and was ready well in time for the judges to waltz in and set up their specific requirements. Off the field, I've never seen such a dedicated team of hardworking women get so much done in such a short time.

Huge thank you to Tamara, the clubrooms were emptied, the stacked tables and chairs all unpacked, tables were set up and scattered everywhere they were needed, tablecloths added and within a blink the clubrooms were converted to a Trial Secretary's office, a dining room, a meal prep kitchen, and a refreshment station. There were tables outside overflowing with the raffle prizes, and another table stacked with our trophies, prizes and sashes. The check-in table was locked and loaded. The barbecue was stocked, and cooking, and everyone hovered waiting for the next jobs, when there were none..... Everything was done! My heart is so full of gratitude for everyone who pitched in to help. The 188 score also awarded them the ESODC Club Member Highest Score in Trial. In the Rally Novice ring, we had Katie Beylin and Bonnie (in their first ever rally trial) awarded 1st place with a score of 97points. Cicilia Perera and Carlos passed with 81points, and Liam Murdock and Bandit with a pass and 75points in their first rally trial too. Monica Niewalda and Oska picked up a beautiful pass with 91points in Rally Excellent, also earning them a 3rd place.

Training News and Tips

It has been a busy time with lots happening in and around the club. Our trial was a great success, our newly formed demonstration team did their first demo at the Whitehorse City Council's SpringFest and our trainee instructors have commenced in the next stage of their training.

You will likely see or have in your classes one of our newest Instructor trainees. They will be taking part of classes as they continue to build their skills and experience. If you have any dog training questions, please don't hesitate to ask any of our instructors – trainee or seasoned.

Training tip – The Power of Consistency

One of the most effective yet often forgotten tools in dog training is consistency. Whether you're teaching your dog to sit, stay, or walk nicely on lead, being consistent with your cues, rewards, and expectations is the key to long-term success.

Dogs thrive on routine and clear communication. For example, if you use the word "down" to mean both "lie down" and "get off the couch," your dog may get confused. Pick one word per behaviour and stick to it AND make sure everyone in your house uses the same cue words and enforces the same rules.



Consistency also applies to rewards. If you reward your dog for sitting politely one day but ignore the same behaviour the next, your dog won't know what's expected. Reinforce good behaviour every time, especially in the early stages of training, we can fade the reward later.

Remember: dogs don't misbehave out of spite—they just follow what they've learned from you. Be consistent, patient, clear, and focus on the desired behaviours, and your dog will be much more likely to learn the behaviours you want.

Meet the Instructors - Miranda

Watkins

Can you introduce yourself and your dog to us?

Hi I'm Miranda! I'm in year 10 (I know, a lot of people assume I'm older than I actually am). My pup's name is Clancy (Or his full name is Clancy Bravestar RekeReke Watkins). Clancy is an 18 month old rescue pup from the Northern Territory who came to us through an organisation by the name of 'Camp Dogs' and before living with us he'd never been in a home without any other dogs. Since we got him he's come a long way, but you'll still see him with a 'Nervous' bandana because he's still a little skittish. Clancy loves jumping, pedestal work, shaking hands with people and playing tug. He's a smart pup, he learns a lot and puts most of it to evil rather than good, for example, learning what gets everyone's attention so that we come and play with him.

What brought you to the club and how long have you been with us?

I've been here for about two years now, and I'm so glad to be here:)

I came to the club after a long trip away with my family, where we came back and my grandmother had adopted a dog, who you may see occasionally, a Cavalier King Charles known as Ruffles (Or Ruffy for short) who is an ex-breeding dog with a whole lot of trauma and a love for food. After training Ruffles for about six months, my parents decided to look into adopting a dog of our own (rescue of course).



Clancy came into our home March 10th 2024, with a whole lot of chaos and a lot more trauma than my parents expected. We took him to his first lesson about two weeks later and since then it's become the highlight of his week. (How do I know that you ask? He tries to herd us all up and out to get to dog training on Sunday mornings)

What do you love about being an Instructor and part of the club?

I love the community and knowledge of all the people in the club, getting tips and tricks from people who have more experience than me. I know that I can ask anyone if I need help with anything or any questions. I also love how welcoming everyone is, and how people adapt to each dog's needs no matter what. Being an instructor is so rewarding, I get to share what I know, what I've learned, and get to keep learning as well. Of course I have to mention meeting all the puppies, that's the best part, obviously. And their owners...

If you could give your beginning training self one bit of advice what would it be?

Keep going, keep practicing and doing as much as you can, it pays off. I know Clancy seems like a handful right now but he's so good, he really just wants to please you and work. It's okay to be tired, even the small things you do counts You're all doing your best, and that's all we can ask, just keep coming back to the club, keep doing things with your dogs, even when it seems hard.

know that we've all been there, I'm sure some of you have seen me running laps of the oval to get Clancy back when he runs away from me with his favourite toy, it gets better, it just takes time.

Whatever way your dog learns best is fine, if they don't like treats that's fine, come up and talk to one of the instructors, we'll be happy to help talk you through training with a toy or something else that your dog wants to use.

What is it Like to Join a Club and

Feel Welcome

A couple of years ago, I was at my lowest point with my dog. After being mistreated in a kennel and picking up bad habits at a dog park, he lunged at another dog, trying to nip its tail. He is large and extremely fast, and I was terrified that one more mistake might mean he would be taken from me. In tears, I stumbled across the ESODC website and rang Liz (club secretary at the time). From that very first call, I was met with patience, calm reassurance, and genuine support.

Today, my dog and I are in the Advanced class, and I am even training to become an Instructor myself. I could not be happier with the decision I made that day—and I only wish I had found ESODC sooner.

What I have learned here at ESODC goes beyond training my dog. I have learned to train myself—understanding how my own behaviour shapes his, for better or worse. ESODC has shown me that training is not just about commands, but about building a partnership.

Just as it takes a village to raise a child, ESODC has been the community I have leaned on to raise my dog. The instructors did not stop at teaching the basics—they encouraged me to stretch further than I thought possible, guiding me into Rally and Obedience trials. Senior members, including those with master-level certificates, generously shared their knowledge and experiences with similar dog breeds, helping me understand my dog in ways I never expected.



At many clubs, newcomers might struggle to be noticed, but at ESODC it is different. Experienced members are mentoring me through my first trials, while even committee members always take the time to chat, share training tips, or laugh with me over silly dog videos. These casual check-ins gave me the encouragement to keep going when I faced hurdles (or doggy incidents). Looking back, what began as a desperate phone call has grown into one of the most rewarding parts of my life. At ESODC, I found guidance, confidence, and a true sense of belonging—for both me and my dog.
