

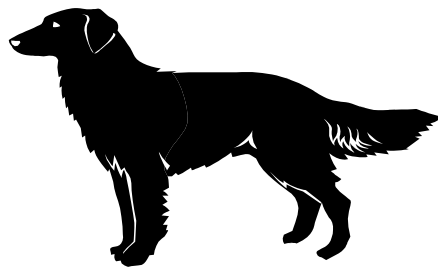

INTRODUCTION

Our Club was formed in 1969 to cater for those owners of purebred dogs who were interested in trailing their dogs to Obedience Trial standard and has been very successful in this regard. On being granted affiliation with the Victorian Canine Association in 1979, all breeds whether registered or not have been accepted.

CLUB RULES

- All dogs should be kept on leash at all times, excepted when given permission to work off leash in class.
- Handlers wishing to leave their dogs tied up on the Club grounds should only do so if their dogs are safe with people especially children. No dog may be tied up where it can reach another dog.
- Dogs in season should not come down to training for four weeks. This does not mean you should stop the training of your dog.
- Dogs must be immunised against distemper and canine hepatitis before coming to classes. This should also be renewed yearly.
- A dog suffering from any illness or skin problems should not be brought to classes until a Vet has pronounced the condition not contagious.
- Handler must remove their dogs excreta from the training area – implements are provided.
- Physical punishment of dogs is not permitted in training classes.
- Instructors have authority over their classes and may ask a member to take their dog out of class if it is disruptive.
- Instructors are not permitted to handle and train a member's dog in class.
- While at the grounds before and after classes please control your dogs.

Training Tips

Teaching your dog to sit, the easiest way is to run your hand down the dogs back until you reach the tail, at the same time lift the dogs front legs up a little and tell the dog to sit.

Teaching the dog to stand, gently pull the lead forward a little with your right hand, then with your left hand over the top of the dog to the back leg with just a little pressure, telling the dog to stand

Teaching your dog the drop from a sit position firstly put your dog in the sit position. Then gently lift the front legs from the back with your right hand then with your left hand gently push down on the shoulders, lift straight up and down telling your dog to drop at the same time.

There is no need to use hand signal at this stage you are all finger and thumbs when you are a beginner, your coordination is not that good in the beginning.

Training your dog requires large amounts of Patience and Persistence.

SCRATCHING

One of most problems suffered by dogs and cats, scratching can be the main symptom for a whole range of skin diseases. It is a common contention that the incidence of skin disease in dogs has a lot to do with the way we keep them.

FOOD ALLERGIES It's true that many cases, food allergies are involved. Most dogs with sensitive skin do better on a low allergy diets than on "cheap' n' cheerful" brands.

CENTRAL HEATING Central heating is also thought to be a factor in many cases; many of our much - loved breeds of dogs are naturally dressed for the cold and we are a little too warm in the average centrally heated house. Overheating can lead to itching and skin disease.

FLEAS Central heating is also involved in flea problems, the most common cause of skin disease in dogs. The breeding cycles of fleas would normally be limited to the warmer months of the year, but in the carpets of most heated homes, fleas can reproduce at an alarming rate all year round.

CONTACT ALLERGIES Carpets can also be involved in one of the less common causes of skin irritation contact allergies. Some dogs have sensitivities to things that they come in contact with and, while grasses, and pollens can be involved, carpet fibres and house dust mites are commonly identified allergies

INTERNAL DISCOMFORT Occasionally, scratching does not relate to primary skin disease. Instead, it can indicate internal pain or discomfort. For example, a dog may scratch his face because he has ear, nose or tooth disease; or his side because he has an internal tumor, abdominal pain, a splinter or sting; or his bottom because he had blocked anal glands. Nerve disease can also cause itching, as abnormal sensations caused by damaged nerves can create skin irritation.

OTHER CAUSES Other causes of skin disease, itching and scratching include liver disease and hereditary skin problems, the latter being relatively common in West Highland White Terriers.

WHAT TO DO ABOUT IT If your dog is diagnosed with sensitive skin and skin allergies, giving him pure cotton bedding on a tiled or linoleum floor in an unheated room may help settle things down. A hypo - allergenic diet may also prove beneficial. The most important precaution against itching and scratching is to treat your dog and sleeping area, regularly for fleas. Modern - day living can have much to do with making dogs itchy

Entree / Snacks – Liver Snacks

Set oven at 150 degrees Celsius before starting. You will need a REALLY sharp knife

Equipment: One sharp knife, Oven trays greased with Canola food spray

Ingredients: Finely prepared even fresh liver strips. The liver is not soaked. Granulated garlic.

Method:

Prepare Liver into strips

Place on prepared oven tray

Put into oven

Turn occasionally - when the liver is dry and hard remove from oven

Allow to cool and store refrigerated in a air tight container

Should keep for 3 weeks
